They're baaaack! And with a vengeance. This kitten season has been like no other. We are overloaded with kittens. Some say the past rainy season produced so much water and food the kittens just multiplied. Whatever the reason, we have many more kittens than in past years. This puts a tremendous strain on our foster homes, our trappers and our finances.

There are so many kittens we do not have enough foster homes for all of them. It breaks our hearts, but we find ourselves having to return kittens as young as 9-1/2 weeks old back to where they came from, after they have been spayed or neutered, provided there is someone to look after them.

We attend to at least 98 percent of the trapping calls that come in. Although sometimes people have to wait, we eventually get to all the situations. Almost all the calls have involved stray or feral mother cats and their kittens, mostly from the South County. We are very fortunate to have a new trapper, Dave Richards, who was inspired to call about trapping after reading the article in last winter's newsletter about our trapper Clint Whitney. He met with Clint, Clint showed him the ropes, and voila! Dave took to trapping like a fish to water. He even had "Cat Man" hats made for himself and Clint. Dave now traps full time with the help of his wife Gay. They even stepped up to the plate when no foster homes were available

and are now fostering kittens from one of his trapping situations. We have another South County trapper, John Fleming, who traps when his schedule allows it, and he is a big help. But we do need more trappers! Dave said to please call him (559)930-7328 if you are interested in trapping. He would be happy to share his experiences. Or you can call Lynette at (805)556-0717.

As the numbers of kitten have multiplied, so have our expenses. Spaying and neutering as well as veterinary costs for cats that need medical care are the highest ever. Expenses for food, litter and medical supplies have also increased dramatically. Although

The kittens were about three weeks old. They were taken to our kitten expert, Julie Coleman, for triage before distributing some of them to foster homes for bottle-feeding. Two kittens were so malnourished that Julie continued to care for them herself. We're happy to report that all the kittens are doing well.

I looked all around a nearby planter, hearing sounds like the meows of a very young kitten. I thought surely the kitten must be in the planter and was too small to be seen above the groundcover.

There were three cars parked nearby, and soon my ears were unmistakably drawn towards one of them. I looked under the car, no kitten, looked in the car, no kitten...then came the dreadful realization that the sound was coming from under the hood!

With no one in sight in the half hour that I was there, I called the SLO Police Department to see if they could look up the owner via the license plate number. They sent an officer to try to help. Luckily, the owner of the car came out just as the officer arrived.

We opened the hood and thought the capture would be easy, but nooooo, not this tiny kitten. He was so small and frightened he escaped our every attempt to catch him, even as car parts were being removed to gain greater access. The officer brought food from Petco, an employee came out to help, and at the height of the rescue there were six people lending a hand.

Finally, victory!! We caught a beautiful fluffy orange kitten looking relatively unscathed, a miracle since the car owner said she had driven to SLO from over Cuesta Grade the previous night. She said she had noticed kittens playing near her car before she left. That means the kitten was in the engine compartment for the ride down the Grade, spent the night there and stayed there until 4:30 pm the next day when the rescue occurred!

Thankfully, I knew Pamela Werth from the Feline Network, and she agreed right away to foster the kitten until he was old enough for adoption. Thank you, Feline Network!! Another precious life saved!

Feline Network Volunteer Helps Spay/Neuter Campaign in Hawaii

I have been trapping cats for spay/neuter for about 25 years now. Twenty of those years I have been involved with the dedicated people of the Feline Network. When I recently became aware of spay/neuter campaigns that were operating internationally, I filled out an application with Animal Balance, a group from the United States, to participate in a week-long MASH unit performing high-volume spay/neuter services in Hilo, Hawaii. Animal Balance was founded in 2004 and since has been serving communities in 10 island countries. They are currently focused on the Galapagos Islands, Cuba, American Somoa and Saipan.

I paid for my travel and arrived in Hilo in mid-July with a long list of supplies and the willingness to work 12 hours each day. Our days began at 7am and ended at 7pm with just enough break time each day to inhale a sandwich and run to the bathroom. I

have never worked so hard in my life. At the end of each day I went back to the hotel, showered off the sweat and cat hair, ate some dinner and fell into bed. My job was in the recovery section, which included giving each cat a vaccination, wormer injection and subcutaneous fluids and then placing the cat back in its carrier.

Within five days we had spayed or neutered 683 cats. We had to stop because we were running out of medical supplies. The director said we worked like "a well-oiled machine" and that this was the largest number of surgeries the group had performed in five days' time.

We could not have done this without all of the individuals and groups that came together to make this happen. Because of the Hilo community response, Animal Balance is in the process of planning another MASH unit for Hilo in the near future. I am humbled by the dedication of everyone involved, as well as the warm welcome we received
