

Kitten Season Springs into Action

Spring is upon us once again and litters of kittens are making their way into the arms of Feline Network volunteers as we gear up for another busy and long rescue season. The Feline Network is actively working to alter the stray and feral cats that come to our attention, and our certificate program continues to help numerous people spay and neuter their cats who would otherwise be unable to do so. The Feline Network has been responsible for spaying and neutering over 1100 cats per year, on average, for the last 11 years. This has only been possible because of your donations. You have also made it possible for us to care for our rescued kittens. Last year we rescued and adopted out 301 kittens!


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The Star Wars Kittens' Wild Ride

Their very young mother had died at birth, and one kitten was deceased upon arrival. The litter was plagued with severe diarrhea, and they were holding onto life by a slender thread.

The five kittens were placed with Sue Dailey and family, an experienced foster home, when they were three weeks old. They were bottle-feeders and were not taking their formula well. They were still being treated for diarrhea. One kitten died when he was five weeks old. "He died snuggled up in my daughter's loving arms and we were happy we could be there to hold and comfort him," said Sue. The remaining four kittens grew stronger and healthier, but they were still in for a wild ride. They were named after Star Wars characters...Chewbacca, Han, Princess Leia and Rae."

In early September Sue noticed watery eyes and occasional sneezes. The kittens were started on antibiotics, but their symptoms worsened and they became very congested. A veterinarian diagnosed a respiratory herpes viral infection, and said he felt they

Gary and Sue moved to a suburb of Phoenix, and their daughter Simone moved into their Oceano home. Out of the blue, one year after Yogi went missing Gary was contacted by SLO Animal Services. A black

Gary and Sue theorized he may have inadvertently hitchhiked to the Nipomo Mesa in a truck that belonged to a neighbor. Simone jumped in her car and brought him home. Simone drove five hours with Yogi and met Gary and Sue halfway in Banning, and then Yogi had to ride another five hours to his new home in Arizona. would probably not survive. "By this time, they were all sitting up, open-mouth breathing as they were unable to breath lying down," said Sue. "I put them in the bathroom and set up a humidifier. We gave them subcutaneous fluids four times a day, plus other medications." Miraculously, the kittens improved, began eating better and became less lethargic. Princess Leia, however, had an infected eye that continued to worsen until it swelled almost shut. An eye specialist diagnosed a herpes lesion and said there was a chance she could lose the eye. At one point Princess Leia was being administered medication 26 times a day. Fortunately, her eye gradually improved and ultimately healed completely.

With the kittens now healthy, the Daileys started advertising the kittens for adoption, but the wild ride was not over yet! Sue noticed a suspicious lesion on Rae's paw and took her to the vet. RAE HAD RINGWORM! Soon they all had ringworm. A seemingly endless cycle of sulfur dips and anti-fungal baths, oral and topical medications began and continued into December, when they were finally declared ringworm-free.

"Throughout all this, these kittens became part of our family and we were only going to adopt them to perfect families," said Sue. She was put in contact with Wasini and Jim Jaurdine, who were looking for two kittens, one for each of their girls. They said they would be interested in them regardless of medical issues. The Jaurdines came and met the kittens and the entire family made an instant connection. They decided they could not split the kittens up after they had gone through so much together and they would adopt all four. "We cried letting them go, but we knew we could not ask for anything more, these four siblings would be together forever with the most wonderful family we could imagine."

Last fall was unique in that there were two other amazing families that were unwilling to split up littermates and adopted litters of four kittens each. We are awed and inspired by so much kindness!

We spay or neuter, test, vaccinate, de-worm and treat all kittens for any medical conditions they may have prior to placing them for adoption. When kittens are ready to be adopted, many of our volunteers spend their Saturdays at our Adopt-a-Cats at Petco in San Luis Obispo.
