Feline Network Celebrates 20 Years!

The Feline Network is pleased to announce that it is celebrating its 20th year as a humane organization! Since our formation in 2002 until the end of 2021, we spayed and neutered 21,135 cats and kittens! Imagine how many litters were not born! One of the indicators of our success is a significant reduction in the number of feral cat feeding stations that some volunteers have faithfully maintained, day after day, year after year. Many of these volunteers have had multiple stations with multiple cats. We honor and thank these faithful feeders!

Two Fairytail Endings

Most people have heard the story of the ugly duckling that turns into a swan, but this story is about a near-death, mangy feral cat that turns into a rare beautiful Scottish Fold/Siamese mix and the end of an era for a Feline Network volunteer who spent 19 solid years feeding cats in Oceano.


Annie Dreizler started trapping cats in Oceano in 2003. Trapping, neutering and returning (TNR) truly works to humanely lower the population and suffering of feral, unwanted cats being born. Several pockets of feral cats that had been spayed or neutered and returned did not have a food source, so she set up feeding stations. She would stop by before work to put food and water out for the feral cats. At one point, Annie had to leave an hour and a half early for work to stop at 13 feeding stations to feed about 165 cats! She even had to hire pet sitters to take care of all of her ferals if she left town. Over the years, most of the cats died naturally. Her backyard is a cat cemetery! When cats needed medical help or became geriatric, she moved them to her house for extra TLC, where she has al-

In an unusual twist of fate, that day came much sooner than expected. A clipped-eared feral cat that was emaciated, sickly and covered in thick layers of mange appeared mysteriously in Darlene's garage. Its eyes were glued shut with crust and its head was scratched until it bled from itching. Darlene took the cat to a vet to be treated. Annie and another volunteer, Anna Stewart, took care of the cat for the next two months, photographing its progress. When the cat's eyes opened it was apparent it was a Siamese mix, but it wasn't until six weeks had passed that Annie was able to positively identify the cat as Scotty, a Scottish Fold/Siamese mix, the last cat eating at her last feeding station. When Anna said she would give Scotty a forever home, Annie closed down her station. It was the end of an era for Annie and a happy ending for both Annie and Scotty.

Annie planned to abandon him in June when she retired and make him find his way to Darlene's

house. She did not want to make another long-term commitment to the feeding station.

Annie still has eight cats living at her house and is part of a crew that feeds feral cats at a farm, so she is not cat-free, but there is light at the end tunnel for someday having a reasonable number of cats to care for.

First Kittens (and Mama) Rescued in 2022



Homemade Incubators

Several Feline Network foster homes specialize in caring for newborn kittens that somehow become separated from their mothers. The survival of these tiny kittens depends on around-the-clock bottle feeding and an environment with closely -controlled temperature and humidity. Commercial incubators are designed for this but cost \$1500 per unit (ideally, Feline Network would have three units). Pamela Werth found a blueprint online for building incubators and set the ball in motion. Pamela, Benita Smith and Kristin Perl modified the design to accommodate our kitties' specific needs and, with power tools in hand, assembled the incubators in the Perls' garage. Our experienced bottle-feeders now stand at-the-ready, better equipped to care for newborn orphans.

Kristin Perl hosted a Facebook fundraiser to finance the project. A major thank you to Judy Michener (a long-time supporter) for contributing the full \$500 toward the project, and to all of the donors who helped us surpass our goal and took us to \$840 in funding! You made this project possible! Each completed unit cost \$120, and the surplus funds purchased our first major order of powdered kitten formula for this season's "bottle babies."

Return Service Requested

Trapper Makes Big Dent in Feral Population

"In 2021, I trapped at 52 different locations and had a total of 343 cats spayed/neutered and returned to their original location. Six of the sites had 20 to 35 cats each. Many of the other sites had more than 10 cats. A caring person feeds and provides shelter for the

returned cats at each location.

I could not trap at these large sites without the <u>monthly</u> "Tip a Tuesday" spay/neuter clinic at Woods Humane Society in Atascadero, where I can have 15 to 20 cats spayed or neutered in one day.

Woods typically spays and neuters 60 to 80 cats on a "Tip a Tuesday" clinic day. In order to transport more than 20 traps and cats, I use my husband's van. While the first 15 or 20 cats are at the clinic, I usually return to the site and set more traps to get any stragglers. It is a very involved process, but it is also very satisfying to get a large group of cats fixed in one swoop!

2022 has started out just as busy. As of today, March 14th, I have trapped 87 cats at 11 sites. Two sites had more than 20 cats each. I have traps set at three different sites tonight. I am looking forward to the next BIG trapping site!"
